#### **Fun Christmas Facts**

1. Fruits were the first ornaments

In the late 17th century, people used fruits like apples, pears, and oranges to decorate Christmas trees. In fact, edible ornaments were so popular that many began to call Christmas trees "sugar trees."

- 2. Candy canes are shaped like Shepard's hooks In 1670, a German choir master asked a local confectioner to shape the candy into its traditional form, resembling a shepherd's hook. In the Christmas story, shepherds traveled from far and wide to visit the infant Jesus. The symbolic candy cane helped keep his choirboys content during long practices.
- 3. Spider webs in your tree are good luck An old Ukrainian folk tale tells about a poor woman who was too poor to decorate her Christmas tree. As she slept, spiders wove her hundreds of intricate webs that served as beautiful ornaments. When Ukrainians find a spider web in their Christmas tree, they consider it good luck.
- 4. Christmas trees take many years to reach a sellable height The average Christmas tree is 6 to 7 feet tall, but it can take as many as 15 years to reach that height. So the next time you buy your year's tree, take a moment to appreciate nature's handy work.
- 5. Alabama was the first state to recognize Christmas In 1836, Alabama became the first state to recognize Christmas as a state holiday, with Arkansas and Louisiana following suit. But it wasn't until 1870 that President Grant declared Christmas a national holiday.



- 6. The first Christmas card was sent in 1843
  The first Christmas card was created and sent by Sir Henry Cole, an English politician. The three-paneled card was embossed with the message "Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You." It was later printed and sold as the idea of the Christmas card took off.
- 7. Coca-Cola played a part in Santa's image
  Santa wasn't always the jolly man in red. Older depictions of Santa
  from the early 1900s depicted him more sternly, and there wasn't a
  standardized "look" for his appearance. The classic image of a happy
  and plump Santa that we all know today came in part from Coca-Cola
  ads, drawn in 1931 by illustrator Haddon Sundblom.
- 8. "Silent Night" is the most recorded song
  We all know the same few handfuls of Christmas songs play at stores
  and on the radio in a loop all season long. But one of them has been
  adapted more than others. "Silent Night" is actually the most-recorded
  Christmas song in history. It's had more than 733 different versions
  copyrighted since 1978.
- 9. We ship a ton of packages at the holidays
  Last year, the U.S. Postal Service processed more than 11.7 billion
  pieces of mail and packages during the holiday season. That includes
  gifts for loved ones, holiday cards, Christmas letters to Santa and of
  course, those dreaded credit card bills from all the gift shopping.

# 10. Tinsel has a storied history

Tinsel was invented in 1610 in Germany. It was spun from real silver and then hammered out and was more of a luxury decoration than the cheap tree trimming it is today. The U.S. government once banned tinsel because it used to contain poisonous lead, but no need to worry now — it's just plastic.
